










BOARD OF EDUCATION APPROVES MANY IMPORTANT ADDITIONS

The 1971-72 school year was a busy one for our Board of Education. They had completed the construction of the new library here at Russell High. Also added were new equipment and new books totaling \$85,000.

In the educational area the Board added a new business education lab and a new language laboratory. There has been a new advanced Chemistry course offered in the science area.

With more people watching football, bleachers, seating 1,523 people, were built on the visitor's side of the stadium. Outside the stadium, fully enclosed asphalt tennis courts have been constructed.

At McDowell Elementary there are new experimental programs operating and full time music and physical education teachers employed.




HEAD ADMINISTRATORS MEET CHALLENGE OF LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

CREATIVE WRITING SPARKS ENGLISH DEPARTMENT









Daytime maintenance personnel provided the means to the way in maintaining high standards at R.H.S. Their meticulous work is evident in the quality of care given to our building daily.






