The Times of our Lives



OVERDONE.

Amy Fisher was sentenced to 5--15 years for shooting the wife of her alleged lover, Joey Buttafuoco. Within two months all three major television networks had shown movies dramatizing the

ELVIS. When the new Elvis postage stamp was unveiled in June, postal patrons had selected the younger King over the more mature Elvis.

GOOD-BYE.
After 11 seasons, viewers no longer had a regular Thursday night date at <u>Cheers</u>. The highly successful NBC series brought back former producers and writers for the last few episodes.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION. History was made in the fall of 1992. Presidential election as a third-party candidate, H. Ross Perot, captured the imagination of many voters. Major party candidates George Bush and Bill Clinton appeared on talk shows and crisscrossed the country making personal appearances to sway the electorate. The Clinton/Gore campaign motto was "Putting People First" as they toured the country by bus, making scores of personal appearances. The Bush/Quayle campaign used a whistle-stop tour to reach voters. Both Barbara Bush and Hillary Clinton were active, often campaigning apart from their husbands. Even Murphy Brown, inhaling, and spelling were part of the hard-fought campaign. In the end, however, it was Clinton's combination of small-town roots and broad visions of change that tipped the American public in his favor.

THE BLIZZARD OF '93. Greenup Countians were digging out as the Blizzard of '93, being dubbed "The Storm of the Century", dumped up to 30 inches of snow on us. Businesses and schools shut down as record low temperatures hampered snowplow crews and motorists trying to clear roads and free ice encrusted cars. Hitting us rather suddenly, the storm was an unexpected late-winter, middle March surprise.

WACO. A religious compound in Waco, Texas, became the scene of a tense standoff when cult leader David Koresh and his followers opened fire on ATF agents who were there investigating a report that weapons were being stockpiled. Four ATF agents were killed and 15 were injured, and a war of nerves ensued as officials waited for Koresh to surrender. The surrender never materialized, since the compound eventually exploded..

SUICIDE DOCTOR. Dr. Jack Kevorkian, the so-called "suicide doctor", raced against time when a Michigan law was passed making assisted suicides illegal. Kevorkian, who had helped 15 terminally ill patients end their lives since 1990, vowed to continue his work until Feb. 25, when the law went into effect.

GREENUP COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL SURVIVES FLU, FLOODS, AND FLURRIES

JANET RENO WASTES NO TIME TAKING THE HELM. Miami prosecutor Janet Reno won unanimous Senate approval to become America's first female attorney general. Reno, 54, took command of the 93,00 employee Justice Department. She is expected to display a style quite different from her recent predecessors. Reno drew praise and support from both Republicans and Democrats

CONGRESS. Not only did the American people choose a new president in 1992, but they elected many new faces to Congress. After complaints about governmental gridlock and a check-bouncing scandal, anti-incumbent sentiments were high. A record-setting number of women and minorities were elected, including Carol Mosely Braun of Illinois, the first Africian-American woman to be elected to the Senate.

WINNERS AGAIN. G.C.'s Jr. Varsity
Cheerleading squad successfully defended their
'92 national title by winning a second
consecutive National Cheerleading Championship in Orlando, Florida. They continued our
well-known tradition of athletic superiority as
they exhibited their gymnastic ability.

CLAMPTON TRIUMPHS WITH 6 GRAMMYS. Eric Clampton collected six trophies, including album of the year for "Unplugged" and record and song of the year. The 47-year old British guitarist picked up his first award of the night for "Tears in Heaven," a melancholy tune written after the death of his 4-year old son in a fall from the 53rd floor apartment in 1991. The other big grammy winner of the night was the music from the Disney movie, Beauty and the Beast" which claimed 4 grammys. Vince Gill swept the country awards with "I still Believe In You."

BLAST ROCKS WORLD TRADE CENTER. An explosion apparently caused by a car bomb in an underground garage shook the World Trade Center in New York with the force of a small earthquake, killing at least nine people, collapsing walls and floors, igniting fries, and plunging the city's largest building complex into smoke, darkness, and fearful chaos. Over six hundred were injured, four hundred of them requiring hospitalization.

This past year saw further proof that the Cold War was over, while other countries flexed their muscles in the latest hot spots. In December, Russian President Boris Yeltsin and former President George Bush agreed to STARTII, a continuing reduction of nuclear arms by Russia and the U.S.

MASHBURN GOES PRO. Pitino knows best: Mash picks the NBA. Kentucky All-American candidate Jamal Mashburn stayed true to his unassuming style as he quietly announced He'll step into basketball's fastest lane next season. Though reluctant to leave UK, Mashburn, as well as Coach Rick Pitino, expressed full confidence that he can hold his own against the world's best players.










