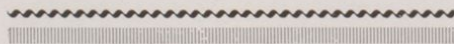


Athletic Club



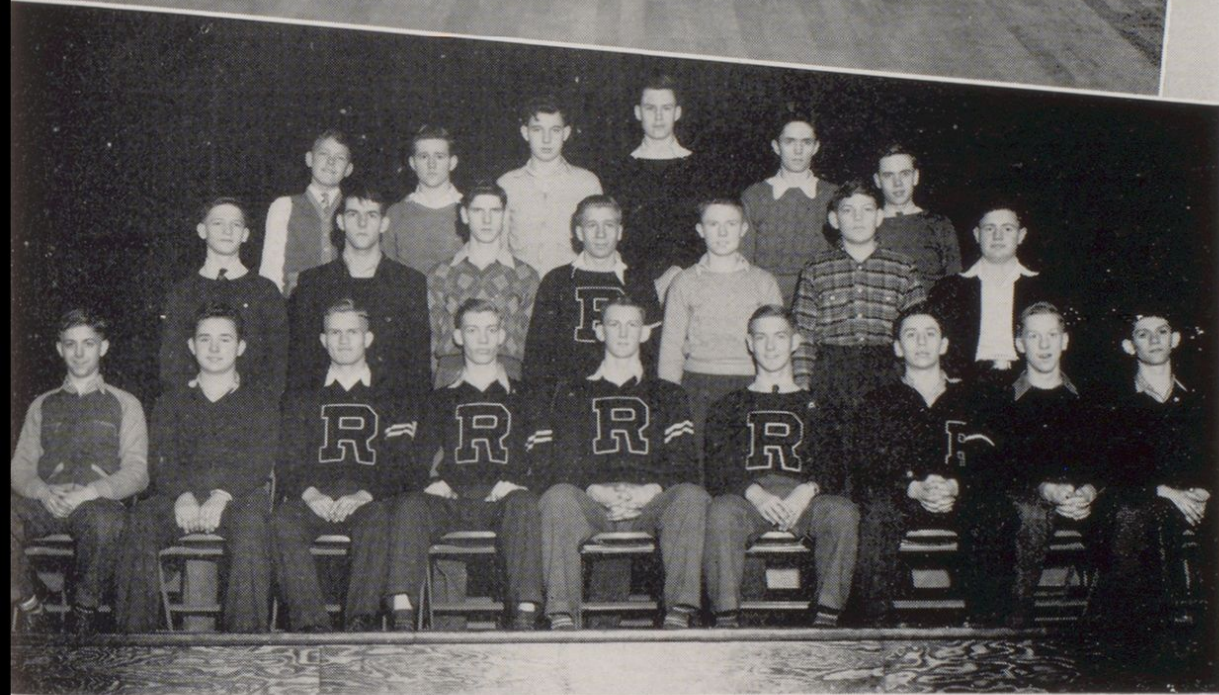

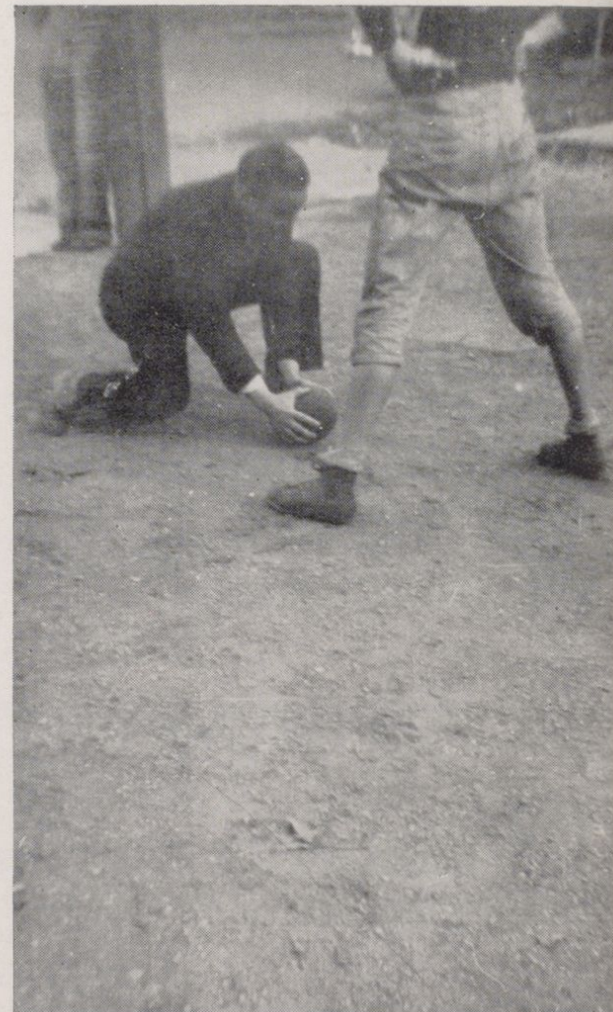


Good Luck To You, Lloyd Patterson

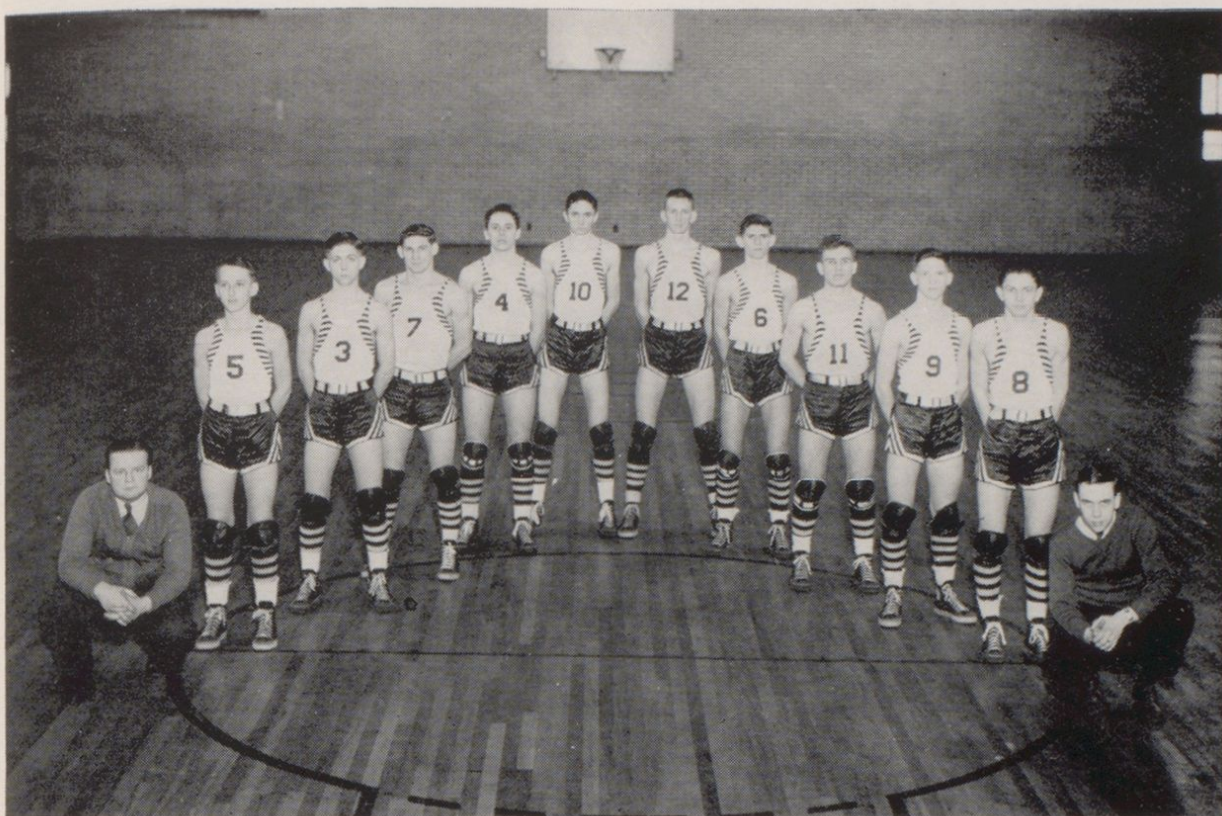
At the Regional Tournament at Morehead, the team was defeated by Grayson by the score of 42-21.



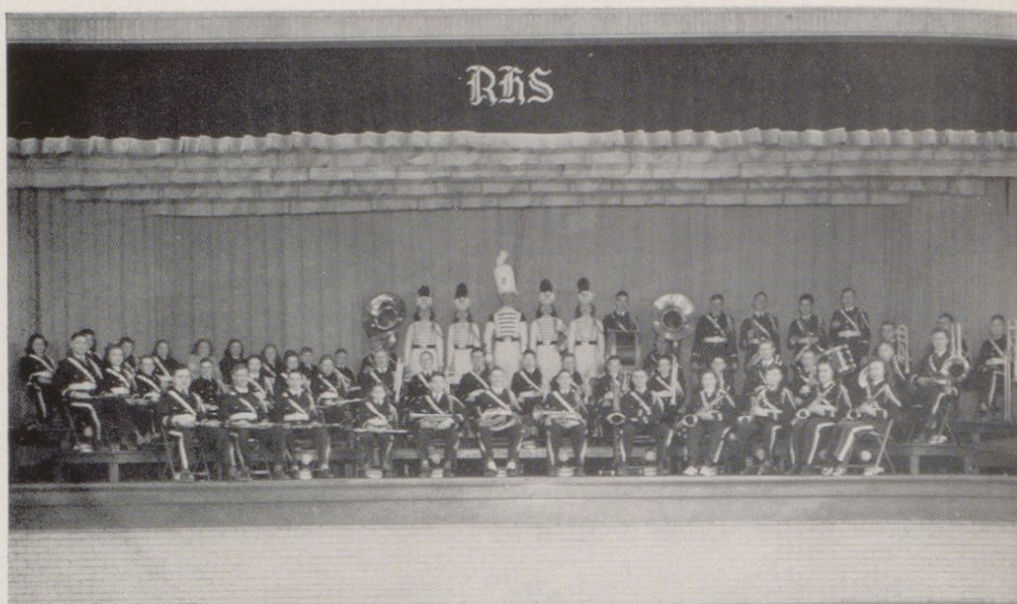
