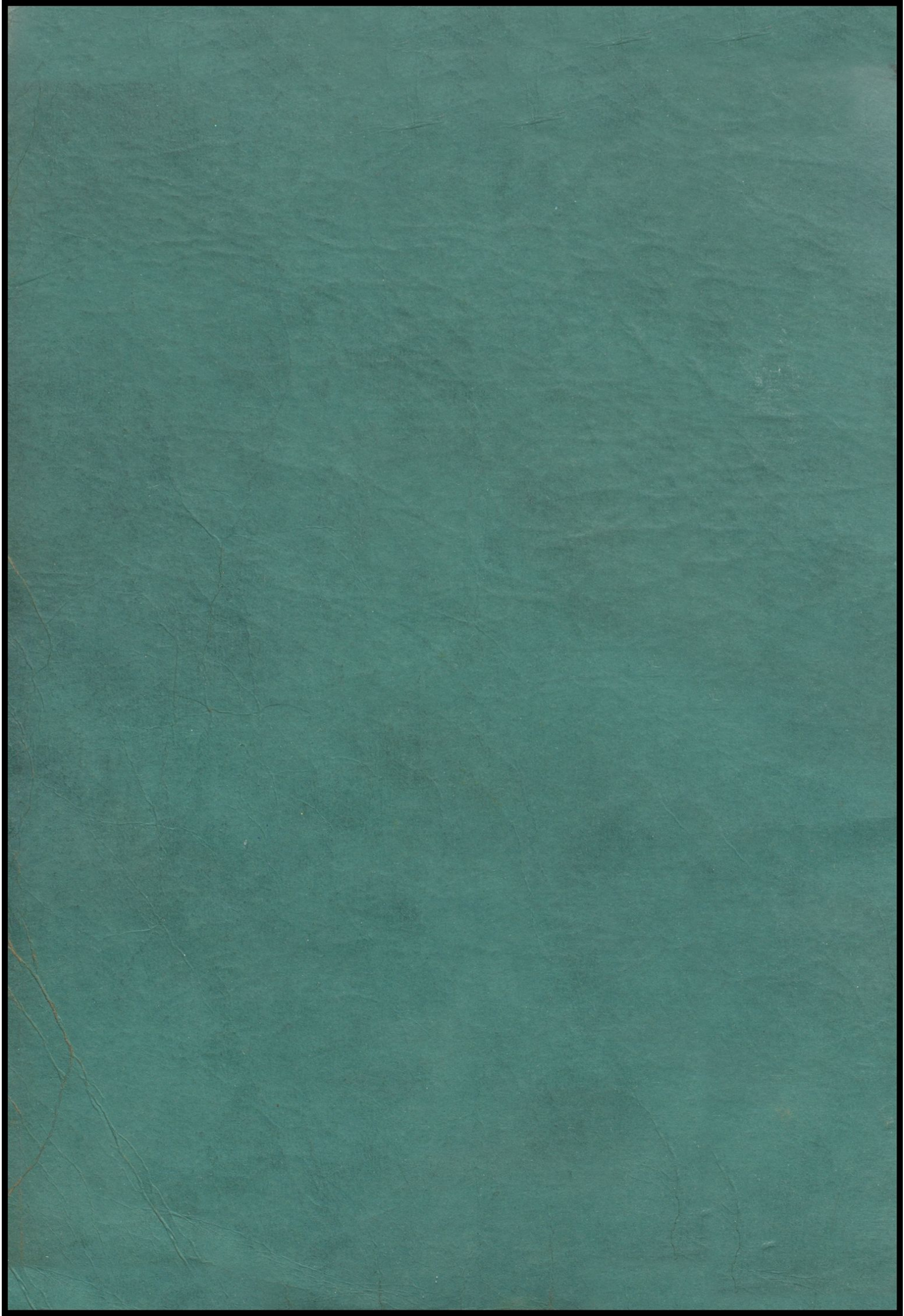

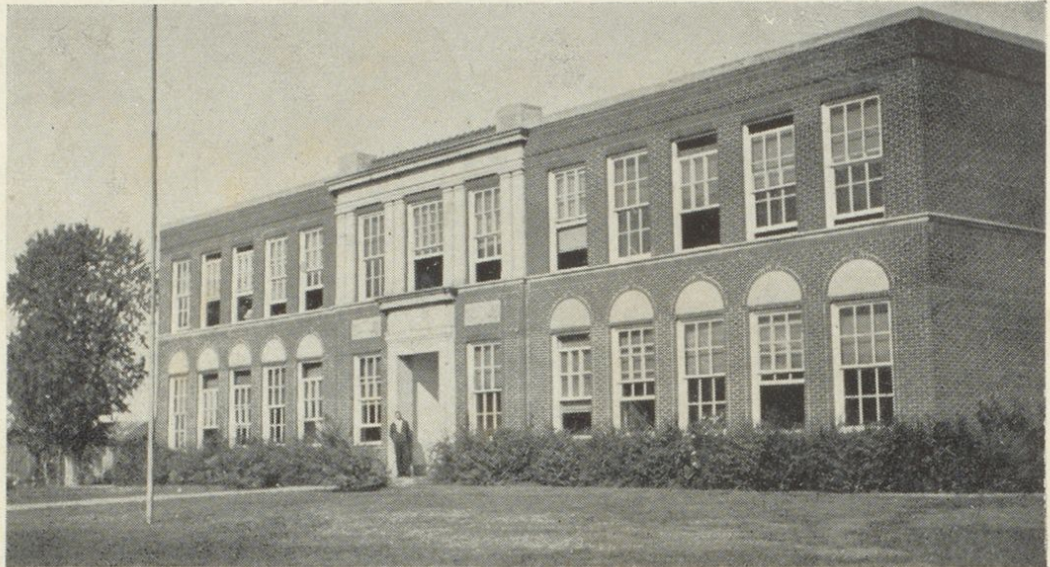
FOREWORD

So anxious to use the new structure are the students and athletic teams, that they can hardly wait for the dedicatory services. Work toward the completion of the floor, bleachers, and stage have been considerably slowed up by the elimination of CWA work, under which the gym was started, but it is believed that our school authorities will have the building completed by the time this book is off the press.

Coach Watters expects to intensely emphasize basketball, volleyball, indoor tennis, and Physical Education, which will include mass athletics, calisthenics, tumbling, gymnastics, etc.

ATHLETICS



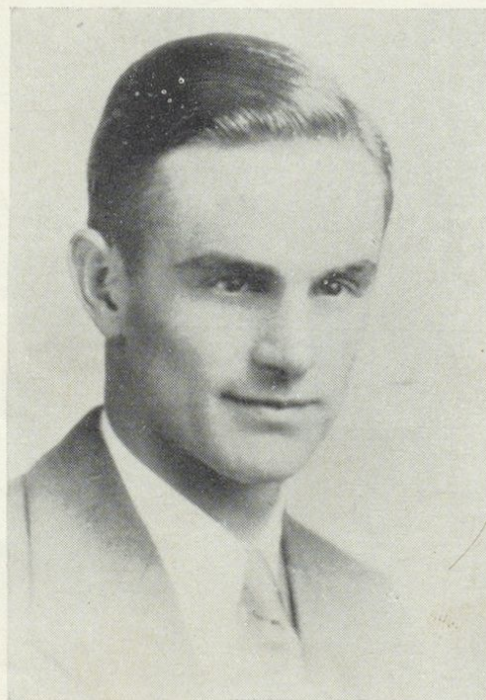


COACH HARRELL—

Since Coach Harrell came here four years ago, Football has had its ups and downs. In 1931, his first year as head coach, the team made a creditable showing, winning seven games and losing four, but since then lack of material has been the big drawback. With good material, Coach Bill could be counted on for a winning combination. His baseball teams have had more luck, however, losing on an average of one game per season. Last year they were undefeated.

COACH WATTERS—

Coach Watters came to us in 1932 as head coach. With meagre material, he produced a team that gave all opponents a run for their money. He introduced Basketball into the program and although there was no gymnasium here in which to practice, his basketeers were no set up. Basketball now has a permanent and popular place on our athletic program. He has the distinction of winning a conference championship with his first efforts at coaching a track team, which was, by the way, the first track team Greenup ever had.



BASEBALL

For the past few years the Greenup High School has produced baseball teams of which it may justly be proud. The Tigers showed much enthusiasm for this sport and as a result they lose on an average of about one game per season. The Tigers could rightly claim the High School baseball championship for this part of the country.

FOOTBALL

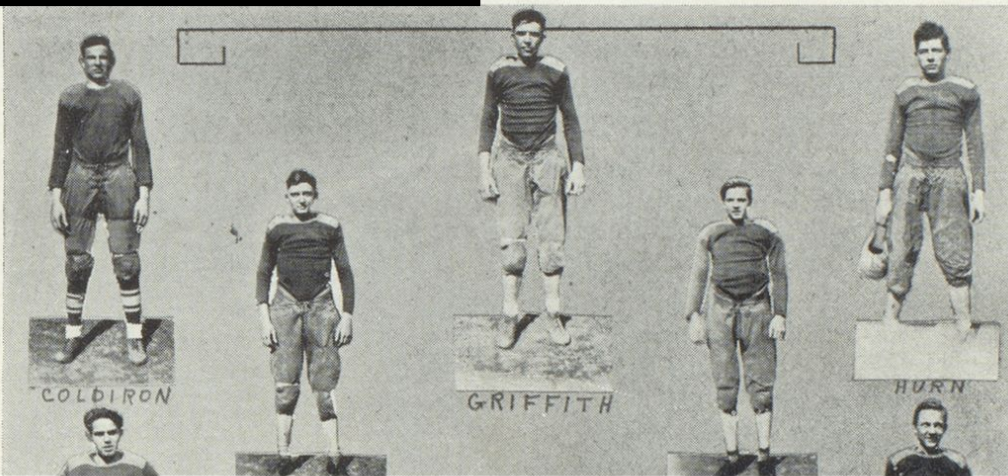


The Greenup football teams have not had such an enviable record the past few years, due to lack of material and ineligibility of the players. This past season has been no exception, some of the games being cancelled because of a shortage in players. The Tigers played several good games, however, including a decisive victory over Olive Hill and a splendid exhibition against the Ashland B team. The Ashlanders were proud to get away with a victory.

Though the Tigers came out of most games on the "little" end

BASKETBALL

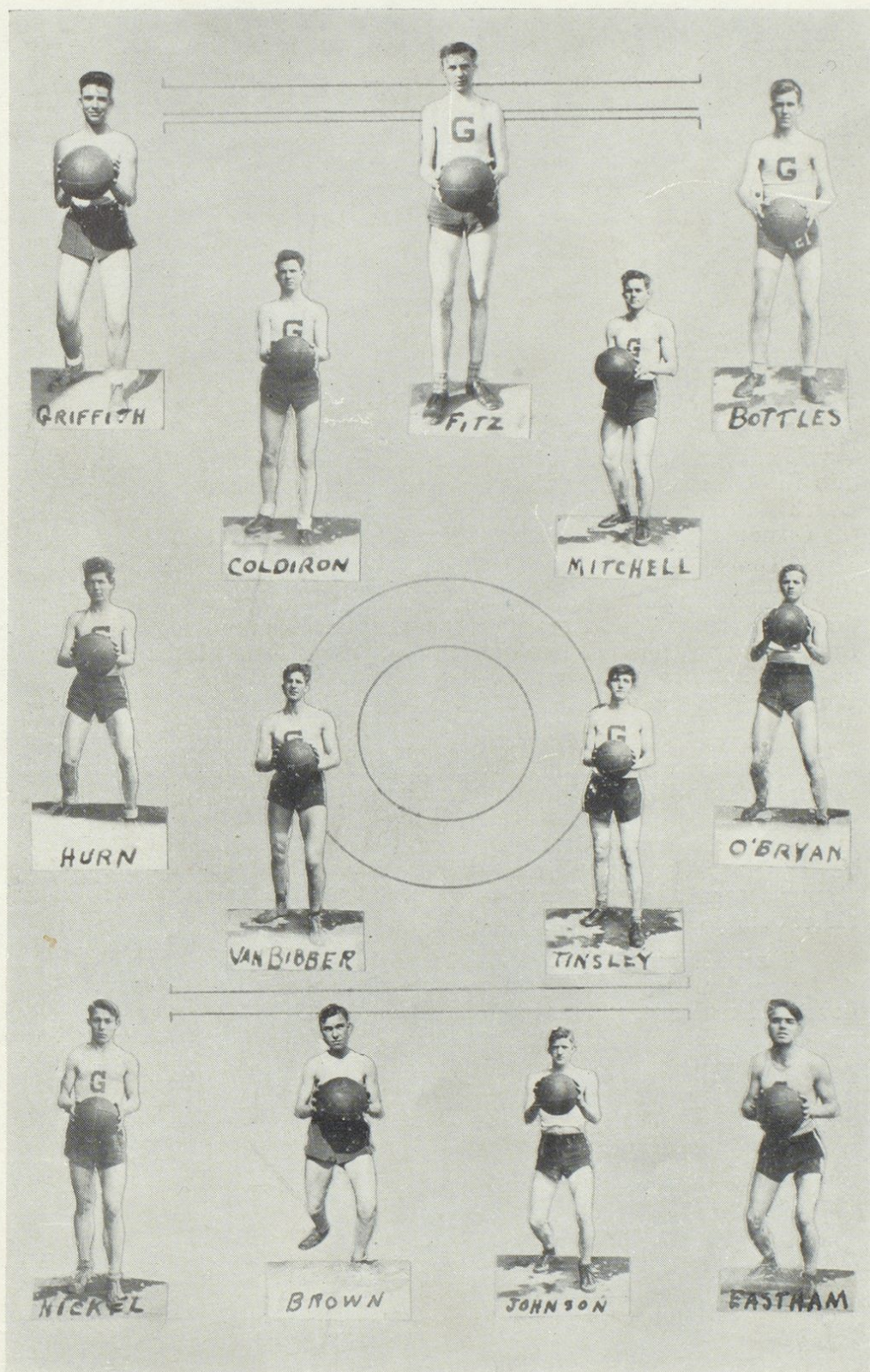
Infants of the hardwood, the Greenup High Tigers show the most promising prospects for next year in basketball of any of the teams in this district. The Tigers reached their best form of the year when they held the Champion Morehead Vikings to a 33-11 count near the end of the current season.

In the District Tournament at Russell, the McKellians had the toughest sort of a battle to eek out a 16 to 13 win over the enraged Tigers, for the honor of meeting the subsequent District Champion Russell Red Devils in the semi-final round. The Tiger Cubs, B team quintette, were top-heavy favorites to win the B District Championship until inelegibility ousted Johnson from the regular berth and hoisted Griffith off the B team onto the A squad. Brown, O'Bryan, and Fitzpatrick also went off the B team, and with four of the starters out, the second stringers were eliminated in the first round by South Portsmouth.

Outstanding among the Tiger performers were two Sophomores, Hurn and Van Bibber. Harold Hurn, the scoring ace of the Green and White, averaged more than 6 points per game for the season against Little Eight Conference competition. Van Bibber, in his first year of basketball play, became one of the best defensive players in the district. In ball handling, speed, and floor work, these two boys were excellent, while Coldiron, Bottles, Johnson, and Griffith played bang-up games all season.

For the team next year, Coach Watters has the following members of this years' squad: Hurn, Van Bibber, Hilton, Griffith, Fitzpatrick, Johnson, Edward Brown, Nicholls, Mitchell, McCoy, and Frank Coldiron. The basketball team showed more class this year than formerly, and with splendid material and a gymnasium to play in next year, the Tiger floor-men promise to be the best drilled quintet in this district. Several teams are already dreading the Greenup Basketball Team of next year.





TRACK

Last year saw the introduction of the fastest of high school sports into the Greenup curriculum. So great was the interest and success of Coach Watter's first effort in having a track team that nothing short of the Championship of the Little Eight Conference would do the Green and White thin clads.

Following the inter-class meet, in which the Seniors ran off with the major part of the honors, the Tigers entertained the Raceland Ramblers in their back yard. The locals ran, threw, leaped, and kicked their way to a smashing 77 to 29 victory for the first inter-scholastic track triumph in the history of the school.

Two weeks later, May 7, 1933, the Tigers fought one of the greatest up-hill battles in the annals of Eastern Ky. athletics to win the Conference championship with a decisive victory in the final event, the half-mile relay, over the strong Boyd County High Lions. With the best balanced squad in Eastern Kentucky, Coach Watters assured his team of victory in all but one track event, and an ultimate team victory by distributing his strength over all the events, and allowing individual honors little consideration.

Kimbo Hurn's 10.4 second win in the 100-yard dash and Van Bibber's 54.4 second victory in the quarter mile show just how rapidly these boys developed under expert tutelage in a short time.

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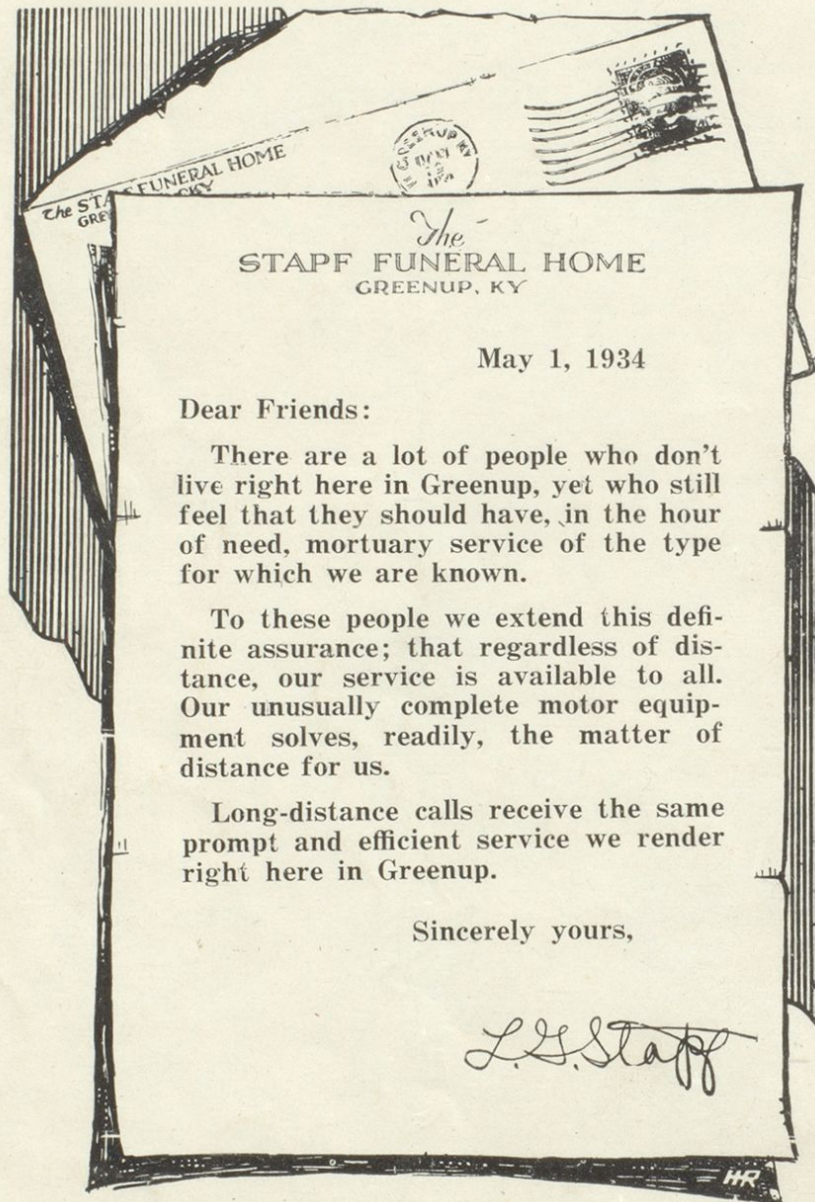


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
