


























Time to Learn about the Government


















Once an annual tradition, the senior play was first produced in 1934 and was entitled "Here Comes Charlie". The first junior play was a Vaudeville show in 1934. The first Sweetheart's Dance, sponsored by the Beta Club, was held in 1947. Mr. Grady Walter took the first Russell High School group on the Close-Up trip to Washington, D.C., in 1979. The first senior trip to New York City was in 1948 and has remained a tradition every year since. The first Junior Prom was in 1939, and the first graduation ceremony was held on May 29, 1918, with fourteen graduating students. Still considered a great honor today, the first Miss Revilonian was Miss Betty Renfro in 1946, while the first Mr. Revilonian was Bob Arthur in 1954. Russell has a history rich with fond memories and traditions.




